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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

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The institutes of higher education, it is needless to say, have to play a pivotal role in the days to come, if we were to realize the dream of the former President of India, **Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam** to metamorphose India into a developed country by ensuing years.

In absence of higher education facility in this tribal and rural area, **NAVCHETAN TRUST** took initiative and established '**Shree Rang Navchetan Mahila Arts College**, in Valia (Dist. Bharuch) in **1994**. The institute is affiliated to **Veer Narmad South Gujarat University, Surat**. It is **Grant-in-aid Women's College** recognized with **UGC 2(f) & 12B**.

This is the **only Women's College** in Bharuch district in **Tribal belt of Eastern Gujarat Region** which imparts higher education to tribal girls with the hostel facilities. At present **500** girls are staying in our **Hostel**. Among them nearly **95%** girls are S.T. who belong to the interior part of the catchment areas.

At present every year, **900** students are taking **benefit of education of Graduation & Post Graduation** from our institution. It's a joint effort of the **College Management** and College Team to place this institution at modest position at present.

The Institution has an Arjunian focus on the mission of **empowering women** and make them socially, professionally and economically self-reliant. Woman, indeed, is the central pillar of the entire social structure, be it the East or the West, no society can ever dream of progress and prosperity with woman playing a second fiddle. 95% girls of our institution are S.T.- from the interior part of our catchment areas, that to the maximum benefit of this college is taken by S.T. girls.

Besides, curricular excellence the college can also boast of having commendable extension and other activities.

Experienced, Enthusiastic and well qualified Staff. 98% faculties are Ph.D. and 02 faculties have cleared GSET. Three faculties are Ph.D. guide.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities undertaken by the college bespeak of the vision and mission of the college. The main thrust of the college is on the curricular aspects; yet, our college, being a women's college, has also to play the pivotal role of empowering women who are part & parcel of the institution. Being the institution permanently affiliated to the Veer Narmad South Gujarat University, it is obligatory for us to keep in centre the curricula designed by the University. However, all the faculty have active representation in various bodies of the University which are linked with updating the academic programmes.

All HOD's are the members of Board of Studies -Syllabus Revision Committee in their respective subjects. Faculty members are paper setters, examiners and moderators at the University level. Faculties regularly attend Faculty Development Programmes on revised syllabus. All the faculties are encouraged by IQAC Committee to attend workshop, short-term courses, seminar, discourse & conference of their respective subjects to get updated in their respective fields.

The college used to impart education through the online platform of Microsoft Teams during corona pandemic. The College has adopted a well-structured mechanism for the effective implementation and delivery of the curriculum. The academic activities are documented through **academic calendar** and **class time tables**. Teachers take utmost care to complete the syllabus in time.

Feedback on syllabus is also taken from all stakeholders - students, alumni, and teacher and the same is shared with the committees for necessary action. The College promotes the use of technology by making available technological infrastructure as required by the curriculum.

We have **02** certificate courses -**Beauty Parlour & Tailoring. (Since 2017 continue)** & Tally & Basic computer Certificate course **(2023 Continue)**. We also run **Value Added Courses** through **BAOU – (2021-22 & 2022-23) viz. MSW, BSW, B.B.A., B.C.A. & Multimedia Communication.**

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Ours is the only women college imparting higher education covering the area of 190 km. i.e. from Ankleshwer to the boarder of Maharashtra State. **And maximum admission seeking girls belong to tribal territory and tribal cast, that's why we haven't any alternative except to give admission to those who are desirous of joining the college. We give admission to the student neither by merit nor by entrance test. Any female student having the bare minimum eligibility for admission to a particular class stands a right to get admission in the institution.**

The institution has a systematic mechanism to assess the learning level of the students. Each department identifies **slow, average and advanced learners through teaching learning process**. Scholars & experts are invited for **advance learners** & for **Slow learners remedial coaching** and **revision sessions** are conducted. **Student-centric** and **participative learning** strategies viz. **giving group discussion, quiz on selected units, practical methods** in subject like **Home Science**. **Class tests** are conducted at regular bases for both U.G. & P.G., viva & term paper are meant for P.G. Student. Special coaching & guidance under the banner of **Career & Vocational Guidance & UDISHA**. For NET & other competitive exam are conducted for aspirants who want to clear competitive exams.

Most of the faculties being **tecno-savvy use ICT tools** for effective teaching. The College also adopts various measures to ensure that the examination related grievances are solved in an efficient and time bound manner. The College has tried to streamline the various programs towards '**Outcome based education**'. Broad objectives and outcomes of graduate and post graduate programmes are defined and conveyed to the students and all stakeholders through orientation programmes and form the College website. The attainment level of the students is assessed through direct method such as internal examination & semester end examination.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College has a Research Committee which has qualified members and a policy in place to promote research. The IQAC encourages the research activities for the faculty members. Experts are invited to encourage research among teachers & PG students. **25 International** as well as **08 National** articles published in **Peer Reviewed Referred Journals**. **24 Papers International & 69 National papers** presented in **Seminar, Conference & Symposia** and most of them published in **ISSN/ISBN Magazine**. **80 National & 10 International Workshops, FDP & Short-Term courses** are attended by Faculties for the enrichment of curriculum. Considerable number of **National & regional level books** were published by faculties. One of the faculties has published **International E-book** also. One Faculty of Economics is running **E-magazine** for economics students.

In 2018-19, We arranged a National Seminar "Modern Trends of Higher Education:India's Super Power Status"

The College has established an Innovation Club as an initiative of the Government of Gujarat to focus and promote start up and entrepreneurship skills among students. The Cell conducts training programmes and seminars with successful entrepreneurs to promote innovative ideas and encourage start up plans.

The NSS conducts extension activities for gender sensitization, financial literacy, personality development, hygiene, health and environmental awareness, electoral awareness, community-oriented activities like eye camp, Sarv- Rog Nidan Camp, thalassemia check-up, traffic safety awareness, self defence programme etc. The extension activities, undertaken by our college, give the students a direct exposure to the world beyond the four walls of the classroom.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our college is keen on the quality of teaching, learning and research, and ensures it through adequate infrastructure and physical facilities. The list of such facilities is as listed.

Building of our college is an asset for us. The **land area** of the building is **2.87 hectare**, with a built-up area of **28700 sq. Mts.** Construction area fit in the rules as per government guideline- **entrance and exit** in each classroom. We are having more than **two main entrances and exits** of the college. We have one **emergency entrance & exits too.** Moreover, we have **special entrance & exit for handicap students with wheelchair.** Our parking area is also considerably large & well managed. **Two-wheeler for students & Four-wheeler parking for staff** are bifurcated.

We are having very spacious staff- room with essential amenities like comfortable chair with desk, assignment racks and separate book racks separate wash area with wash basin for faculties. We have separate three computers especially for the use of faculty for preparing materials, PPT or slides for classroom teachings.

All essential amenities and facilities are available in SRNM Hostel. Full time Security & a Rector are available to girls in the hostel.

Student Support and Progression

The College aims at the holistic development of students to facilitate their better future. The College provides FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE through Government scholarships, endowment to needy students. **3560 students** benefited by scholarship (**3,17,89,162**) provided by government. from **2018 -23**. In Year 2023- 24, **733** number of students benefited by the scholarship. The skill enhancement activities of the students are organised by the college that includes Campus to corporate training and communication skills. Life skills are imparted particularly to the girl students such as self-defense training. The college has an MOU with Rotary Club of Bharuch under which students enhance their skills by joining **Certificate Courses** like **Beauty Parlour and Tailoring**. **Considerable number of our students have passed various competitive exams like NET/SLET**. Time & again our students **get gold medal in their respective subjects**. **Our college results have always been higher than the average results of the University**. Various activities are conducted for the development of students under the banner of **Innovation Club, Electoral Literacy Club, NSS, UDISHA, Career & Vocational Guidance, Women's Club, Saptadhara, Punch Prakash, Azadi ka Amrut Mahotsav, G-20, Sports, IPR and Finishing Club**. The college has set-up Zero Tolerance Policy regarding sexual harassment and anti-ragging. **The institution has a transparent Mechanism of Timely Redressal of Students Grievances**. As 95% of girls belonged to Schedule Tribe, the institution also established **ST/ SC Cell** as per the government rules and regulations. All particulars about the programmes offered, paper style, duration of the programme, evaluation method, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities etc. are discussed with students during orientation programme.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is equipped with a standing committee responsible for overseeing the policy matters of the institution. The college is comprised of an Admission Committee, an Examination Committee, Career & Vocational guidance Cell. Placement Cell and a Student Representative Council (SRC) In order to attain academic excellence, the college arranges seminars, webinars, conferences, online & offline quiz etc. The college actively promotes student participation in curricular, cocurricular and cultural activities. The IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) plays a crucial role in the establishment and implementation of quality

assurance policies and processes within an institution.

Shree Rang Navchetan Mahila Arts College, Valia Managed by Shree Navchetan Education Society established in the year 1994. Having a permanent affiliation to the Veer Narmad South Gujarat University, Surat, the college has become a jewel in the crown of higher education for women in the tribal belt of Eastern Gujarat region. Within a short span, college has left behind 'footprints' on the sands of time that will continue to inspire academicians and social reformers for years to come. Both in terms of the strength of students and quality education, the college reigns supreme in the galaxy of higher education, that too exclusively for women in general and tribal in particular with **the strength 891 bona-fide students registered in the academic year 2023-24.**

Shri Rang Navchetan Education Society, Valia runs Various Education institutions including Commerce College. The principal works as link between the teaching and non-teaching staff and also with the office bearers of the Society. An attempt is made to decentralize authority with the formation of various committees to carry out different tasks independently in tune with the vision and goals of the institution. The income and expenditure statements are regularly audited with external auditors. **Shree rang Navchetan Society established Women's College especially for the upliftment of tribal girls - to impart higher education to those who really needs an exposure so it is the mission of our institute. To make tribal student aware of traditional and modern approach (in higher education) in this area itself is Herculean task for the management and all the associated members.** To educate downtrodden & suppressed community is the mission of our institution.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The chief concern of the institute is to maintain the high standard of academic quality and excellence achieved in the last decades. Education is a dynamic and not a static force. The curriculum at any stage of education has to be designed keeping in mind the social needs. As we have mentioned that ours is the tribal territory & girls belonged to the same race. So, an establishment of women's college itself is one of the best practices in this tribal area and it shows management's awareness and Innovative disposition.

Orientation & Welcome Programme for beginners is regular practice of our institution. As ours is women's college, we acknowledge beginners every year "How to use Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine & Incinerator" (Pad Disposal Machine) in our college.

Our NSS Team has adopted three villages namely Kanerav, Vitthalgam and Rajpara for nurturing and enhancing rural area. The institute also provided services to the local community by arranging Eye Camp and Sarv Rog Nidan Camp with the joint effort of NSS Team & Jhagadiya Seva Rural.

No Plastic Campaign is also conducted by NSS Team. We call experts from myriad sectors as Banking, Law, Entrepreneur, Doctors and Dietitians for the betterment of woman. Time and again, we conduct guest lecture on Women's health & Hygiene, Common Deficiency in Women etc. On 15-02-2019, Information Regarding 181 Abhayam App was given by Bharuch dist. Central Police. Abhayam App was downloaded by girls for their safety.

Teaching through Power Point Presentation is our daily practice in course like English, (Graduation) Hindi & Economics (Graduation & Post Graduation)

Celebration of “Foundation Day of Shree Rang Navchetan Mahila Arts College” is our regular best practice. We inspire students to prepare for Competitive Exams for their career development under the banner of Udisha Club. One of our Faculties took regular classes on every Saturday for Competitive Exams. (Year 2022-23). We have ample of books on Competitive Exams (UPSC, GPSC, SLET, NET, IAS, Revenue Officer, Revenue Clerk, Railway Recruitment, Police Constable, IPS, IRS, IFS, CCC+ etc.)

Sports Events, Cultural Events, Self - Défense Training & Yoga Training are our regular practices. That help students to maintain their physical fitness as preached by Ancient Rishis – “Robust mind lives in robust body.”

Hindi Week Celebration, Sanskrit Saptah & other Commemorative Days Celebration like Teacher’s Day, Martyr’s Day, Constitutional Day, Ozon Day, Republic & Independence Day, NSS Day etc. are arranged by all the faculties.

Response:

The college offers 06 courses in arts which inculcates 04 languages and 02 Social Sciences. **Syllabus of all 04 languages -Hindi, Gujarati, English, & Sanskrit offered by the institution are** organized for integration of ethical values. **The Syllabus of all 06 subjects -Hindi, Gujarati, English, Sanskrit, Home-Science & Economics offered by the institution lays emphasis on sensitization towards gender issues.** The Institution has also set up various Cells and Committees to deal with the same.

The Institution offers Environmental Studies as a Compulsory Subject at the First and the Second Semesters. Such a subject is able to inculcate awareness towards environmental issues and issues related to environment awareness & protection, climate changes, Sustainability, Pollution Control, Conservation of Natural Resources and Human Values.

In Arts Faculty, there are many topics which highlights professional ethics, nationalism, environmental awareness, gender sensitization, human, moral and cultural values and sustainable development. In

Social Science, we offered **Economics (B.A. M.A.) in which all most all topics of Environmental Economics** covered the issue of **sustainable development programme**. In Sanskrit, human values like Friendship, truth, morality bravery, humility, sympathy, empathy, devotion etc. are taught. In Hindi, human values, women empowerment, nationalism are taught. Hindi Subject is taught as a foundation and core Subject in Arts faculty. In FYBA, the text, “Vishnupriya” is taught which raises issues of female identity and independence. The text “**Rashmirathi**” and ‘**Katha Manjari**’ deal with social issues. The issues of gender and socialisation are expressed in ‘**Anaro**’. Ethics and human values are explored in ‘**Mr.Abhimanyu**’. In Gujarati, the text titled ‘**Vananchal**’ is prescribed which explores the aspects of environment sustainability and human Values. The texts of Gujarati literature prescribed in B.A. deal with Gujarati culture. They expressed rich heritage of Gujarat and India. In Gujarati Compulsory and Principal Subject “**Vevishal**”, “**Narmada ni Parikrama**”, “**Pruthvi Vallabh**” etc. novels reflect on Gender Issue, human values. Indian ethos & culture.

English literature is taught in B.A. which makes the students aware about the global forms of literature. They become aware of universal values as reflected in the works of **Shakespeare, Milton, Aristotle, Tolstoy and Rabindranath Tagore**. Motivational literature and gender-studies are prescribed in the New Syllabus of English.

The students learn consumer behaviour, population economy agriculture, market structure, human development index, social welfare, human resources modern reforms and poverty index and woman development index in Economics. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1**

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

In internal assessment test at Shree Rang Navchetan Women's Arts College Walia, however, the roll number of the student is on the answer sheet. But the external examination (semester examination) conducted by Veer Narmad South Gujarat University is transparently evaluated. For example, a khaki sticker is placed on the answer book where the student's exam number, exam center number etc. information is, and answer books from different colleges affiliated to the university are mixed and sent to different colleges in different packets. Hence the examiner cannot know which answer book belongs to which student of which college. Thus, the evaluation of the external examination is done in a transparent manner.

College follows rules implemented by VNSGU except the internal exam schedule which is conducted as per college calendar. Presently the college follows following pattern for internal evaluation of the students in B.A. Students' evaluation is definitely a major indicator of their performance. Since present exam system does not have any yardstick to measure student's competence individually, teacher and institution make use of this indicator at various level. Students with excellent performance are given more opportunity and encouraged to develop their ability in various fields. Slow learners are offered counselling and guidelines to get through exam so that they may not drop their study. Institution uses this indicator to form the future policies that can be benefitted to such students If the student is not satisfied

with his/her marks, he/she can get his/her answer book reassessed or rechecked in particular subject after getting consent from the principal. Teacher concerned is instructed by the principal to clarify student's doubts in person showing his/her answer books and explaining evaluation method. If some discrepancy is found, necessary changes are done and concerned departments are also informed about the modification. Rechecking of the marks is done of all semester students. Students can go for rechecking/reassessment within 10 days after the result is declared. Dissatisfied students can apply for reassessment only in the final semester. If the difference found is more than 11 marks, student is given modified new mark sheet. SC/ST/OBC students are charged only 50% fees for rechecking/reassessment.

At the end of every term college deposits certain fees to university:

The institute has purchase committee for purchases.

The accountant in the college under the guidance of the principal records day to day financial transactions and verified and attested through vouchers. The accounts are done by TALLY software and checked and verified by the accountant, Office Superintendent and the Principal periodically. The policies for budget and accounts preparation are made by the management. In the month of December, the College prepares the annual budget and gets it approved in the LAC after discussion. The LAC consists of a Chartered Accountant appointed by the management. Then the budget is sent to the management which gives the approval and then the budget is implemented. At the end of the year, an internal audit is done by the management. The external audits are done by auditors appointed by our management. The audited accounts are also placed before the LAC for approval and then they are sent to the management. External audit is also done by the auditors from the Gujarat Government periodically.

And in line with this a robust feedback system has been developed in which all the stakeholders and in particular student's feedback is emphasized upon by the college management. Complete feedback is taken from the students for the Course they are being taught, the faculty who is teaching and on the infrastructure of the college. This feedback is then analysed and an action taken report is also prepared after rigorous discussions. Our college ensures the transparency in evaluation has made it customary to show all the students their answer books. This enables students to see their own answer scripts after the evaluation, discuss their answers with the teachers, and if they have committed any mistakes, know about them and find out the ways to rectify them. The IQAC continuously reviews and takes steps to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process.

The standard methods of teaching, learning, and evaluation which are proven over the years are being followed as follows: An Academic Callender is prepared well in advanced and displayed on the college website. An Orientation Program is done for all the new students every year where Students are apprised of the Time-Table, Programme structure, syllabi of the courses etc.

College have taken skill-oriented courses with experimental training incremental improvement is done every year in academic Activities, Teaching-Learning Process and Quality initiatives. Quality Enhancement and Quality Sustainable techniques used in working. The institution does not analyse the knowledge level of the students enrolled before the commencement of the programme. However, once the students are enrolled, their level is identified and teachers plan teaching-learning accordingly. The establishment of Women's College itself is major initiative of our Navchetan Trust to promote gender equality. Institute provides safe, healthy teaching learning environment to girl students. Strength of tribal girl students is almost 95% percent in the college. So, institution is working for the upliftment of deprived females of society. Institute campus is protected by CCTV surveillance. Discipline Committee has been set up comprising girl students. Lectures regarding safety measures are organized and the Police Officers, Military trainers, legal experts, social workers and entrepreneurs are invited for the betterment of girls. The college provides 'Abhayam' helpline numbers at many places. Canteen is provided in campus only for the safety purpose of girls.

Institute has created Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal of sexual Harassment Cell per UGC norms. Self- Défense workshop is organized to avoid any untoward incident with the girl students. Data regarding safety measures for the girl students is regularly provided to UGC.

The college girls' students have made up their mark in academic, curricular and co-curricular activities as well as sports.

The Cell facilitates women empowerment through workshop, training programme, guest lectures and other meaningful activities to educate and sensitize the girl students. **Discourse on Women's Empowerment. Women Empowerment Week Celebration. Amdawad Grannus Organization is called to guide volunteers. Grannus Organization is a third-generation technology based social enterprise started with the aim to strengthen safety & emergency system of Women Safety, lost children search, medical emergency & safety of helpless. Self- Defence Training by Dr. Heenaben Patel to Volunteers in NSS Camp. On Eve of Mamta Day (An Important Day for Safe Motherhood Programme), Block Center was visited & cleaned by NSS Volunteers. Yog session was organised on the eve of International Women's Day. Teaching and nonteaching staff participated in the programme.**

Our institution offers three certificate courses- Beauty Parlour, Tailoring & Certificate Course in Computer not only the girls Who take admission in our college but women from society in general. We take vacation batches for female for society. All the courses enhance employability of women in general & tribal in particular. Home-Science course is offered in the institution and soft-skills are inbuilt in its syllabi. Mahendi, Rangoli, Hair-style, Recipe & Culinary are our regular practices.

The Women Empowerment Cell of the college strives to achieve its objectives and aims at social upliftment of the girl students. The Cell facilitates empowerment through workshop, training programme,

guest lectures and other meaningful activities to educate and sensitize the girl students.

One Day workshop on Chocolate making conducted by Home-Science Department. Girls learned to make various types of chocolates & cake.

One differently abled student of commerce college taught the skill to Home-Science girls. Self-defense training was also given to the girl students by **Dr. Heena L. Patel. Assi. Prof. of Self-finance English.** Such training prepares them mentally and physically to defend themselves in dangerous and unforeseen circumstances.

The students actively participated and clarified their doubts. In the month of December Cell organised Orientation Programme for First year girl students. The members apprised them about the objectives of the Cell, need of the WEC and various activities of the Cell.

Title of the practice: Instilling Social Responsibility Through Activities is one of the core objectives of our college. The college makes the students aware of their obligation to the society, especially the weaker section. Practical knowledge of life is gained only when the students step out of the campus and get engrossed in the problem of society.

Objectives of the Practice

To fulfil the vision mission of the institution. To help the downtrodden people. To help the government in implementing its development schemes

The Context: Education is not just acquiring knowledge and obtaining degree but using the knowledge gained to the benefit of the mass. Instilling social responsibility in a student helps him to realize his potential and turn it to his own benefit and to the benefit of the society in which he lives. It helps to foster empathy in students and help them to balance self, society and environment.

The Practice
